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PREFACE

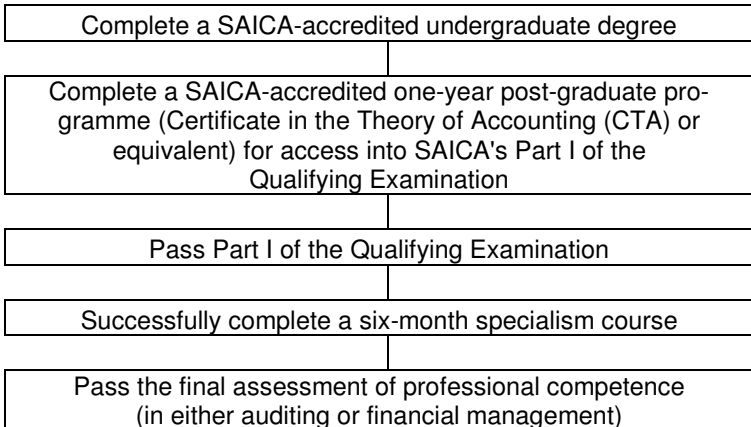

There is a hugely compelling reason why we (SAICA) insist on maintaining and enhancing world class standards – international investors would shy away from South Africa if the financial statements upon which they based their investment decisions were in any way suspect.

This is why the process of becoming a CA (SA) is so rigorous.

In order to become a CA (SA) one must follow the following **education** process:



A **training** period of 3 years must be undertaken after completing the under graduate and CTA programme on a full-time basis. The qualifying examinations are usually written during this period of training. (Note, however, that some students study on a part-time basis from the commencement of their undergraduate studies, in which case the period of training will be longer than the 3 years.)

Graduates of programmes not accredited by SAICA cannot gain direct access into a SAICA accredited programme, as the programmes at these institutions are of a more general nature and do not allow students to gain the specialised competencies required for the Part I assessment.

For SAICA to accredit a university's programme(s), it requires commitment and resources. For example, to name but a few:

- A sufficient number of suitably qualified staff;
- Adequate and suitable lecture and tutorial venues; and
- Suitable computer facilities.

Students may end up in non-accredited universities because they are financially constrained and therefore have no option, but to attend the university closest to their home. There are however many bursaries available to talented students; bursaries that facilitate study at an accredited university. SAICA's Thuthuka Bursary Fund, the prime aim of which is to transform the demographics of the CA profession to reflect those of the country in terms of race and gender, is one such prospective bursary fund.

The purpose of this document is therefore to guide students / learners who wish to qualify as a CA in choosing an appropriate tertiary institution at which to study and to ensure that students are aware of those universities whose programmes are accredited by SAICA and through which they can begin the long, but rewarding, journey to obtain the prestigious designation of CA (SA). Further information about the universities is provided to allow the student to select the institution which may be most suitable to his or her needs.

What do CAs do?

It is impossible to list all the activities which Chartered Accountants become involved in post qualification. However the following represents a broad spectrum of likely activities and functions.

Chartered Accountants

In Public Practice

- **Auditing/assurance.** Auditors review company systems, financial statements and accounting principles while checking the accuracy of the company's financial records. The auditor is responsible for issuing an opinion on whether or not annual financial statements fairly present a company's results and financial position.
- **Taxation.** Chartered Accountants in public practice advise their clients on how to lawfully minimise their tax liabilities through efficient tax planning. They also submit tax returns, resolve tax problems, advise on tax implications, advise on litigation matters and generally aid clients with their personal financial affairs.
- **Financial Management.** Budgeting, cash flow forecasting, business plans and advice regarding corporate structures are all skills that clients expect to be available from their advisors in this area.
- **Management Consultancy.** Advising clients on the management of their businesses to make them more profitable and effective. Chartered Accountants often have an intimate business involvement with their smaller clients.
- **Secretarial and Accounting Services.** Design and implement accounting systems, capture and record financial data and assist clients to comply with various requirements of the Companies Act.
- **Information Technology.** Develop computer information systems to enhance business performance.
- **Management Accounting.** Delivering up to date information on the status of a company to enable management to make decisions about the day to day running of the business.

- **Corporate Finance.** Can involve acquisitions and sales of assets on behalf of clients, including negotiations and due diligence work.
- **Forensic Accounting.** This specialist area involves investigative accounting where fraudulent accounting may be suspected. It can mean serving as an expert witness if a case goes to court.
- **Insolvency.** If a company is in trouble its chances of recovery must be assessed. Receivers are involved in selling a company as a going concern, and liquidators in selling off assets to pay creditors. An administrator plans for the organisation's survival through restructuring.

Commerce and Industry

The experience gained here is as varied as professional practice described above but also includes:

- Prepare financial statements
- Record, monitor and interpret financial results
- Devise and install reporting, cost accounting and computer systems
- Improve internal and production controls
- Develop future plans
- Ensure maximum financial effectiveness and efficiency within the organisation
- Perform the role of financial manager or accountant, financial director, treasurer, controller, company secretary, cost and management accountant, tax specialist, internal auditor etc and be a key member of the top management team
- There are many different types of environments in which a CA might find himself from banking to investment decisions to retail to manufacturing etc.

Academia

In the academic world Chartered Accountants are often in demand as lecturers. As academics, they not only teach, but also contribute to the profession through research and are expected to participate in the development of professional standards. Many academics also act as consultants.

Other

Chartered Accountants are also equipped with the appropriate knowledge and skills to move into a number of other different areas and many CA's end up as self employed entrepreneurs.

Tips for the completion of tertiary institutions application forms:

Note: *Tertiary institutions structure application forms differently, and this only serves as a guide.*

The application form: General tips

If you have applied for admission to study at a tertiary institution and you have received an application form to complete:

- Photocopy the form and fill in the copy as practice (to avoid making mistakes on the original form);
- Use black ink (use a pen you are comfortable with);
- Write in capital letters;
- Read each question carefully and thoroughly;
- Refer to the booklet with directions for applicants for the codes and notes, if available; and
- Do not write in the “for office use only” area;

NB - An incomplete application form will delay the processing of the application for admission.

Important tips

- Apply to the relevant institution as early as possible
- Complete your application timeously by finding out when the universities closing date for applications is. (The January after your matric results are known is too late)
- Because you should be applying BEFORE your final matric results are known you MUST enclose your Grade 11 results. It is therefore important that you do well in your Grade 11 year as well as your matric year.

Personal details

Name, address, telephone number, age (date of birth), nationality and home language. Please complete your full name. Write your address in full. Give a telephone number where you can be contacted, and indicate whether it is a home number or neighbour's number (for messages). Give your age and nationality because if you do not, it will look as if you have something to hide.

Programme of study for which you are applying

Give your choices: e.g. first choice BCom (Accounting), second choice BCom (Economics) and third choice BSc (Information Systems). Please ensure that the faculty codes are entered into the appropriate boxes.

Details of school education

Please provide the name and address of the schools you attended, subjects to be written including grades and examining authority (e.g. Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal, etc.). Include Grade 11 and 12 exam results and ensure that an official school stamp and the signature of the principal has been obtained.

Details of your parent/guardian or your next of kin (if 21 years of age or over)

Please make sure this section is completed in full, and indicate the person's relationship to you (e.g. father, mother, guardian).

Interests / hobbies

Never lie – show a balanced use of your spare time.

References

Please use teachers who know you very well as referees. Remember to ask a person if they are prepared to act as a referee for you before using their name as a reference.

Housing / Residence

Please indicate whether you wish to apply for student housing or not.

Funding application

Please indicate whether you wish to apply for funding.

Many educational institutions have their own scholarships or bursaries. They are not awarded purely on high scholastic achievements. The bursary committee in each institution may consider many other aspects such as financial need, sporting achievements, proof of leadership qualities, steady progress and improvement through Grade 10 and 11, etc.

Parents should ask their employers if a bursary scheme is available for the children of employees.

Some tertiary institutions have lists of organisations that offer bursaries for which you may apply. Apply to the various organisations at the beginning of your Grade 12 year.

Declaration and undertakings by applicant

Please make sure you sign the application form. If you are under 21 years of age, your parent/guardian must also sign the form. Many tertiary institutions use the application form as part of the contract and if you have lied, you could find yourself in trouble. Ensure that you attach certified copies of a valid identity document.

Application fee

The prescribed application fee must accompany the application form and is not refundable. Please do not enclose cash.

Thuthuka programme

The country simply does not have sufficient numbers of skilled people to handle all the complex processes of transformation. This is also the case in the accountancy profession and accordingly SAICA was tasked with creating a transformation plan and strategy. The outcome was the establishment of the Thuthuka Education Upliftment Fund in 2002, with the express objective of changing the overall numbers and demographic representation of the profession. Since that time a number of programmes and initiatives have been launched under the Thuthuka banner, and their impact is clear from the accelerated pace of African and Coloured membership growth and increased numbers of prospective CAs.

The stated goals of the new BEE Charter for the CA profession commits the profession to transformation targets for African and Coloured membership by 2014, which is only six years away. This has increased the pressure on SAICA and academic institutions to accelerate and enhance the education of potential African and Coloured CAs and resulted in a re-evaluation of the transformation strategy in the light of the targets.

SAICA realised that given the profession's limited capacity and resources, it would only be possible to address a few priority areas, and that it is therefore imperative that key priorities are targeted by focused initiatives. In the light of these considerations we recommend that 70% of the focus of the Transformation Division over the next six years be on undergraduate, post-graduate, QE and trainee programmes.

School level

At this level we will continue to focus on career awareness and promotion of Chartered Accountancy as a career, but we rec-

ommend that only one kind of Thuthuka school intervention programme, the Thuthuka Higher Education Feeder Programme, be undertaken in future. Such a programme will enable SAICA to identify and select 200 to 300 (depending on funding) learners to place on the Thuthuka Bursary Fund Programme.

With regard to existing projects at school level, we recommend that the DST camps be continued and the contract be renewed, but that all other Thuthuka school projects be completed but not renewed. Small projects, such as the Saturday classes and Pastel accounting olympiad, which do not require much effort or funding but nevertheless give a good return on investment, should be continued.

Undergraduate level

At undergraduate level the objectives are to increase the number of African and Coloured students following a Chartered Accountancy career through career awareness presentations, to increase the number of Thuthuka bursary students, to improve throughput pass percentages at accredited universities, and to work with the University of Limpopo to ensure that students who graduate are accepted into accredited CTA or equivalent full-time programmes.

The aim of the reconstituted Thuthuka Bursary Fund is to select students from the Thuthuka schools programmes and place them on Thuthuka undergraduate university programmes. The Fund currently places students at the Universities of Cape Town, Johannesburg, Stellenbosch, Nelson Mandela Metropolitan and Pretoria. The University of the Free State has recently been added to offer this programme.

The Mafikeng campus of the North-West University provides an excellent opportunity to extend the 'capacity' of the CA programme, particularly to African students, and a pilot programme was launched here in 2008. Initiatives at the Universities of Fort Hare and Limpopo are presently funded by the Department of Labour through the National Skills Fund.

With regard to the 13 accredited higher education institutions, the Education Committee has now embarked on a rigorous process of monitoring their education programmes as well as the performance of candidates in the QE. All the Thuthuka universities were visited to map out strategies on how to improve

the throughput pass percentages. Each university provided plans and a scorecard on how to increase its numbers, adapted to its particular situation and circumstances.

The undergraduate drop-out figure is alarmingly high at Unisa, the only undergraduate distance learning institution. Throughput rates at the CTA level for both UNISA and UKZN remain of concern (both offer this programme by the distance learning route).

Postgraduate level

The aim at this level is to ensure that all Thuthuka students who graduate are funded to complete their CTA or equivalents on a full-time basis and to improve the pass percentages of African and Coloured distance education as well as residential students studying for their CTAs or equivalent.

The first priority is to ensure that all Thuthuka students complete their CTA full time, at a successful residential university, and are fully funded. The further objective is to ensure that African and Coloured students who obtained their undergraduate degrees from an accredited programme at a residential university are able to complete a CTA or equivalent programme with them, even if they did not meet all the entry requirements. Extra assistance may be introduced for these students.

No less than 87% of the African and Coloured students are studying for their CTA through distance learning, but they currently have an extremely low pass rate. As previous initiatives for postgraduate Unisa students were not particularly successful, a new pilot programme will be implemented in 2009.

The Thuthuka small practices project seeks to address the issue of talented learners who do not have the correct entry level qualifications and the lack of access of small practices to Black trainees, by bringing the two groups together. SAICA also funds certain additional support programmes, consisting of a series of Saturday classes in East London, Port Elizabeth and Cape Town, and these will be continued.

Qualifying Examination level

The objective of intervention at this level is to improve the pass rate of African and Coloured QE candidates attempting Part 1 of the examination for the second, third or fourth time. Past interventions were not very successful, but a dedicated part-time intervention was started in August 2007. These candidates

wrote QE Part 1 in March 2008. The intention is to run this programme annually.

Trainees

The Transformation Unit has never really had dedicated programmes at this level, but is aware of the issues facing African and Coloured trainees. However, interventions between employers and trainees are fraught with difficulties and a task force has been set up to investigate possible interventions.

At all these levels involvement by members of the accountancy profession is essential, for only then will it be possible to bring about meaningful change in the CA profession. SAICA would also like to consolidate all funding into the Thuthuka Bursary Fund, which would give firms the opportunity to place their own contracted and identified students on the Thuthuka Bursary Fund Programme from 2009. Such a consolidation of efforts would be to the advantage of all concerned.

It is essential that a transformation strategy of this nature be evaluated and amended on a continuous basis. Further, it should be borne in mind that there are no quick fixes and a 'one size fits all' approach is not appropriate to our country with its great diversity of peoples and needs. Nor does transformation come cheap – it requires substantial funding, time and effort. However, by working together and focussing on priority areas, it will be possible to achieve transformation of our profession.

THUTHUKA BURSARY FUND

The Thuthuka Bursary Fund is a key element in the comprehensive transformation strategy of the accounting profession. For a long time, the lack of literacy and numeracy skills of black learners entering higher education institutions as well as poor career guidance hindered young people with previously disadvantaged backgrounds from entering the accounting profession. Many efforts to address these problems have been small and disparate, preventing an effective impact.

The Thuthuka Bursary Fund is aimed increasing the entry numbers and improving the throughput pass percentages of black learners at tertiary level through not only providing financial support but addressing the needs of the whole student with a comprehensive programme and working with the students as a group. The Thuthuka Bursary Fund has seen an exciting consolidation that has allowed the universities and profession to effectively work together and, for the first time, with one another in a programmatic and revolutionary manner.

The Thuthuka Bursary Fund aims to place between 200-300 African and Coloured students annually at selected accredited universities on special undergraduate BCom Accounting programmes. This includes the development of life skills and workplace readiness skills. The universities that are currently committed to working with the Thuthuka group of students are the University of the Witwatersrand, the University of Cape Town, the University of Johannesburg, the University of Pretoria, the Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University and Stellenbosch University.

Application Criteria

Students who meet the following criteria are eligible to apply:

- Students who have at least a 60% in Mathematics (Not Maths Literacy!);
- African and Coloured students who aspire to become Chartered Accountants;
- Students who are from previously disadvantaged backgrounds;
- Students who are writing for a university entrance (Matric exemption).

Application Process

- Complete an application form (Closing date: 30 June every year). Ensure to include all the required supporting documents
- Apply to one of the universities working with Thuthuka Bursary Fund
- Upon selection, write the AARP Test

BACKGROUND

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for entry into an undergraduate degree programme at Monash South Africa, students must hold one of the following:

- the South African Senior Certificate (SAFCERT) endorsing that the student has met the minimum requirements for university entrance in South Africa; or
- the South African National Senior Certificate (NSC); or
- a certificate issued by the Matriculation Board exempting the student from having to obtain SAFCERT certification; or
- GCE A Levels; or

- the International Baccalaureate Diploma; or
- relevant post-secondary qualifications; or
- other international qualifications deemed to be equivalent to the above (subject to university approval).

When applying, students should submit certified original copies of one of the above qualifications, as well as final grades in subjects undertaken.

English Language Requirements – Degree Entry

English is the language of instruction and assessment at Monash South Africa. Students must meet one of the following English requirements in order to be eligible for admission:

- A pass in an examination equivalent to English at the higher grade (first or second language) in the South African Senior Certificate, or a score of 4 (50 – 59%) in the National Senior Certificate (NSC).
- A pass in English at A level, O level, minimum of a C, International Baccalaureate or equivalent.
- American Tests of English (paper based) as a Foreign Language (TOEFL), achieving a minimum score of 580 with a Test of Written English (TWE) score of 4.5 or more – scores must be available for both TOEFL and TWE.
- Internet-based TOEFL: 90 overall, Writing 22 and no section below 20.
- International English Language Testing Service (IELTS), achieving a minimum score of 6.5 (Reading 6.5, Listening 6.5, Writing 6, Speaking 6).

Admission rating South African National Senior Certificate (NSC) 2008

From 2008 South African school leavers wrote the National Senior Certificate (NSC) for entry into Higher Education. To qualify for the NSC, a learner needs six subjects. The learner must pass five subjects and one of which must be a university language of instruction.

Monash selects students according to academic merit. Applicants who have sat the National Senior Certificate (NSC) can calculate their scores and likely acceptance levels for specific programmes as outlined below:

FACILITIES OFFERED

Safe and secure study environment

Monash South Africa is situated on a 100–hectare site 25 kilometres north–west of central Johannesburg, at 144 Peter Rd (near Hendrik Potgieter Road and Beyers Naudé Drive) in Ruimsig.

There is 24–hour security on campus with regular security patrols. Students living on campus have swipe–card entry to their accommodation and the residences are fully managed.

Impressive state–of–the–art teaching facilities include high–tech lecture theatres and tutorial rooms, a library with access to the fully digitised Monash periodical and serials collection, computer labs with cutting–edge PCs, a student association office, a bookshop and a bistro.

Monash prides itself on the ability to provide personalised teaching to its students. The largest lecture theatre seats 350 students in comfort, and small tutorial groups ensure personalised teaching. All lecture theatres and tutorial rooms are equipped with high–quality technology to enable multimedia teaching.

Sports facilities

Sports facilities on campus include two basketball/netball courts and a playing field large enough to accommodate soccer, rugby and hockey and two volleyball courts. Arrangements have been

negotiated for Monash students to utilise other sporting facilities such as the tennis courts at a private school next to the campus and golf and tennis facilities at the nearby Roodepoort country club.

The campus is less than a kilometre from the Roodepoort Athletics Stadium and there are also gymnasiums and equestrian, scuba diving, martial arts and sporting clubs in the area.

A permanent sports officer at Monash South Africa focuses on the continued development of sports and sports facilities on the campus.

Monash students currently participate competitively in soccer, basketball, tennis, table tennis, netball, action cricket, rugby, touch rugby, volleyball and chess and indoor soccer.

In the last couple of years Monash sports teams have been on tours to neighbouring countries.

Students are encouraged to establish new clubs and have recently formed a pool club and ballroom dancing and aerobics classes are held in the residence. There is also a fully equipped gymnasium on campus.

Shopping

The upmarket Clearwater Mall, which is about five kilometres from the Monash South Africa campus, houses all the major department stores, boutiques, speciality shops, cinemas and restaurants. Northgate Mall is about 10 kilometres from the campus.

Shopping facilities are also available at the Featherbrook shopping complex within 500 metres of the campus. Cafes, restaurants, banking facilities and a supermarket are available here.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students wishing to major in the field of Chartered Accountancy can enrol for one of two programmes:

- A three-year **B Com in Accounting for Chartered Accountants** which is aimed specifically at students wishing to qualify as Chartered Accountants (SA). This degree is followed by a one-year B Com Honours (Accounting) degree in preparation for SAICA's Part I of the Qualifying Examination.
- Alternatively, NMMU offers a four-year **B Com Rationum** degree, also aimed at students wishing to qualify as Chartered Accountants, but allowing them to complete an additional major in either: Computer Science & Information Systems, Law or Economics / Business Management.

The relatively small class sizes and personal attention from academic staff make NMMU the ideal environment for students studying the **B Com Honours (Chartered Accounting)** degree.

B Com (Accounting for Chartered Accountants) or B Com Rationum

Minimum NSC requirements for degree entry must be met.

• Admission Points Score (see method of computation below*)	At least 38
• English, Afrikaans or isiXhosa (home language or first additional language)	At least a level 3 (40-49%)
• Mathematics	NSC achievement rating of at least 5 (60-69%)

Important notes should you not meet the above requirements for direct admission:

1. Should you not meet the above minimum admission requirements, but have an APS above 22, you will be referred for access testing at the university (please contact the Admissions Office for further information). The test results, together with your NSC results, will then be used to determine your admission possibilities at NMMU.

2. Alternatively, you can enrol for the B Com (General Accounting) which has lower admission requirements:

• Admission Points Score	At least 38
• English, Afrikaans or isiXhosa (home language or first additional language)	At least a level 3 (40-49%)
• Mathematics <u>OR</u> • Mathematical Literacy	NSC achievement rating of at least 4 (50-59%) NSC achievement rating of at least 6 (70-79%)

Should your academic performance in this programme meet certain prescribed requirements (per the Faculty Prospectus), you will be able to transfer to the B Com (Accounting for Chartered Accountants) programme.

Having determined the APS point for each of the seven subjects, add these together to compute an overall APS total score (which is the “Admission Points Score”).

Is Accounting as a School Subject Compulsory?

No. The programme is designed both for students who have done accounting at school and for those who have not.

B Com Honours (Accounting)

Persons shall be registered as students for the B Com Honours (Accounting) programme only if they:

- have obtained the degree of B Com (Accounting for Chartered Accountants), the degree of B Com (Rationum), or any other SAICA accredited Bachelor’s degree.
- attained the following prerequisites in the two years preceding the year of registration for the Honours programme:

- A pass mark in Accounting 301 or General Accounting 301 and a mark of at least 55% for Accounting 302;
- A pass mark in Taxation 301 or General Taxation 301 and a mark of at least 55% for Taxation 302;
- A pass mark in Auditing 301 or General Auditing 301 and a mark of at least 55% for Auditing 302;
- A mark of at least 55% for both Management Accounting 301 and 302.

Please note: The Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University has the right to change the admission requirements. A restricted number of students are accepted in certain fields of study.

BACKGROUND

The programme for Chartered Accountants' training is one of six programmes in the School of Accounting Sciences, in the faculty of Economic and Management Sciences. The other programmes include that of SAIPA-, CIMA-, Forensic Accountants training, Taxation as well as a research programme.

Honours and masters degrees are offered in all academic programmes. The School also offers a PhD in Accountancy and other subject areas such as Management Accounting and Taxation.

The school currently has 55 staff members on the Potchefstroom Campus of which 35 are permanent academic staff. Of these 21 are Chartered Accountants. There are 13 and 11 staff members at the Vaal and Mafikeng campuses respectively, of which the majority are CAs.

The undergraduate programme is offered at the Potchefstroom-, Vaal- and Mafikeng campuses, and the CTA programme is only offered at the Potchefstroom and Vaal campuses. The University has formed a partnership with SAICA's transformation unit, Thuthuka, to improve the capacity and skills of the programme at the Mafikeng Campus. This capacity building Thuthuka programme began on the Mafikeng Campus in 2008. There is also a University sponsored transformation programme at the Potchefstroom campus.

The university has managed a good pass rate in QE1 over the past years and has constantly increased its number of successful candidates.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The following admission requirements for 2011 are applicable:

B Com Chartered Accountancy

For entry into the B.Com Chartered Accountancy a learner must have passed Maths at level 4 and have an APS score of at least 26. (this will change for 2012 intake) Accounting is strongly recommended. Students that did not have accounting at school can consult the programme leader for individual study planning.

Admittance into the Second and Third year of studies towards the B Com Chartered Accountancy Degree

Students need to pass Accounting 1 with a mark of at least 55% to proceed to the next academic year. In the second year students again need to pass Accounting 2 with a mark of 55% to proceed to Accounting 3.

Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA)

For entry into the CTA (honours) a student needs an average mark of 60% for financial accounting third year and a combined average mark of 55% for auditing, tax and management accounting/financial management on third year level.

Students from other universities

Students from other accredited universities will be accepted if the hurdle rates are met. One year of studies is subtracted from a student of non-accredited universities.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The following admission requirements apply for studies commencing in 2009:

B Com (Accounting)

This is the specialised three-year undergraduate degree for candidates who wish to qualify as chartered accountants. This degree is followed by a one-year Postgraduate Diploma in Accountancy (CTA equivalent).

For admission to the B Com (Accounting), prospective learners must comply with the following minimum requirements:

- English (as a home language or additional language), and another language both at rating 4 or above.
- Either Mathematics at rating 4 or above or Mathematical Literacy at rating 5 or above. Mathematics is strongly recommended as opposed to Mathematical Literacy.
- Three other subjects, one of which must be from the designated list at rating 4 or above.
- Life Orientation must be at least at rating 3.
- Admission Points System (APS) total must be 30 or above. Applicants with 30-35 points will be admitted at the discretion of the Dean. Applicants with more than 35 points will obtain automatic acceptance.

Postgraduate Diploma in Accountancy (P Dip Acc)

This is the specialised postgraduate diploma for candidates who wish to qualify as chartered accountants.

For admission, learners are required to achieve at least the following results at the third year level of the undergraduate degree.

- Financial Accounting 3: 60%
- Management Accounting and Finance 1: 55%
- Taxation 1: 55%
- Auditing 1: 55%

A degree of flexibility may be observed in the application of the abovementioned criteria.

Learners from other universities

Applications are accepted from learners who have completed their undergraduate studies at another university. Admission is judged on the merits of each application.

FACILITIES OFFERED

Rhodes owes its unique character among South African universities to a combination of factors some historical, some geographical, some cultural and some architectural. An important influence in this respect is the University's smallness which, together with its residence system, allows close academic contact between students and their lecturers, in surroundings that foster fellowships and learning. BACKGROUND

The Department of Accounting was founded in 1921 and is one of the largest Departments at University of Cape Town. The Department of Accounting is housed in the Commerce Faculty which continues to expand the programmes it offers its students. These programmes prepare students for the personnel needs of the fast-growing world of financial service industries and prepare them for participation in the global economy. The Department offers two accounting major undergraduate degrees: a four-year Bachelor of Business Science (B Bus Sc) and a three-year Bachelor of Commerce (B Com). At the postgraduate level, the Department offers the Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting (generically referred to as a CTA) and structured Masters Degrees in Financial Management, Strategic Cost Management and Taxation.

The Department also offers the Postgraduate Diploma in Management (Accounting Conversion Course) which is a unique programme in South Africa. This diploma is an accelerated one-year full-time programme for selected graduates from any discipline, other than accounting, who wish to pursue a career as a Chartered Accountant. The programme consists of a year of intensive study in undergraduate courses over an extended academic year commencing in January. Thereafter successful candidates are eligible to apply for the one-year Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting. On successful completion of both the

conversion course and the Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting, candidates may write Part I of the Qualifying Examination (QEI).

The Department has a professional focus under-pinned by sound academic principles. We subscribe to the concept of educating for life. Consequently quality is an uncompromising goal. Notwithstanding the high academic standards subscribed to, we provide access and support for under-prepared candidates.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The University of Fort Hare has two degrees that give access to the Post Graduate Diploma in Accounting which is a pre-requisite to sit for SAICA's Part I of the qualifying examination (QEI). This arose mainly out of the introduction of a Thuthuka B.Com programme which had a foundation year built into it. This was in recognition of the challenges brought by the Schooling system in which many of the students would not have done the appropriate Mathematics grade to allow them entry into the programme. The second consideration was that Fort Hare is predominantly catering for communities in which the language of communication is not English and as such the level of English proficiency needed to be upgraded in order for students to cope with the technical content of the programme.

All students will undergo a placement test which will see them being assessed on their strengths to handle the rigours of the accounting programme. The University subscribes to the Na-

tional Benchmark Test (NBT) where all students are expected to sit for the placement test.

For students to proceed with Accounting for CAs in the CA stream (B Com (Accounting)), they will need to obtain a minimum of 55% at all levels otherwise they are transferred to the alternative stream.

Curriculum for alternative programme

The alternative stream was introduced in 2009 and has resulted in two programmes running parallel which ensures that students that do not meet the minimum threshold requirements are redirected to the alternative stream.

The alternative stream B.Com differs from the CA stream course by the type of accounting course taken.

Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting (PRELIMINARY) (East London)

Students who do not qualify for the Post Graduate Diploma may be accepted on a preliminary registration which effectively repeats the third year courses of the B Com (Accounting) degree

Prerequisites: B Com or similar degree or Technikon Degree. Entrance is at the discretion of the Head of Department. Students may receive a Post Graduate Diploma in Accounting (Preliminary) certificate after successful completion of the course. In order to gain entry to the PGDip Acc, students would have to obtain at least 55% for Accounting 3 and an average of 55% for the other 3 major subjects.

PG Dip.Acc Programme

In order to obtain admission to the **PG Dip.Acc** programme, students need to have completed all four major subjects of Auditing III, Financial Management III, Taxation III and Accounting III with a pass rate of 55% for Accounting III and an average of 55% for three remaining subjects.

Successful completion of the **PG Dip.Acc** programme requires students to pass all four subjects at Post Graduate level on the same exam sitting. For purposes of this course, the supplementary examination is regarded as part of the main exam and a student can be allowed a maximum of only two modules to write in supplementary.

Module exemption / Students from other universities

The University of Fort Hare exempts candidates from attendance and assessment in a module on the grounds of their having obtained credit for the same or equivalent module prescribed for another qualification of the University. Candidates from another institution may also be granted recognition, provided that candidates who are already in possession of a first qualification shall be granted recognition towards a second qualification at the same or at a lower NQF level in respect of modules previously completed only up to a maximum of half of the prescribed credits required for a second qualification. UFH therefore recognises modules from other Universities to the maximum of half the courses prescribed for the qualification.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The B Com Hons in Accounting and the B Acc degree allows entrance to an accredited CTA programme.

Entrance requirements at the undergraduate level for the 2011 intake, are as follows:

Admission requirements for the CTA programme

B.Acc. degree or (equivalent as approved by the Programme Director: Training of Accountants), with the understanding that a combined average of 58 % must be obtained in FIN 308/REK608, ODT 308/AUD608, BLS308/BEL608 and BRF308/MAF608 with at least 55% in FIN308/REK608.

Requirements to successfully complete the CTA programme:

If a minimum of 50% in each of the four modules, namely: FIN608, BRF608, BLS608 and ODT608 must be passed simultaneously in the examination.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The following admission requirements for studies commencing in 2010 at the University of Johannesburg (UJ) are as they applied at the time of going to print:

B Com Accounting Degree

This qualification is primarily designed to provide students with a comprehensive knowledge base for identifying, analysing, evaluating and solving problems in four underlying core subjects:

- Accounting
- Auditing
- Taxation
- Financial Management

Students should be able to reflect on their decisions and applications in these fields to assess the effect thereof in the holistic context of accounting as a practice.

Since the programme is focused on the principles and theory of the core subjects, students acquire the appropriate competence that serves as a basis for entry into several postgraduate study opportunities as well as the labour market. This programme also forms part of the requirements towards becoming a Chartered Accountant registered with the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants.

An Admission Point Score (APS) of 28 is needed for admission to the B Com Accounting degree. Students must also have passed Mathematics with a minimum score of 3.

The minimum requirements for entry into the B Com Accounting degree can be set out as follows:

Admission Point Score (APS) Score of 28. The APS is calculated based on the achievement in six recognised 20-credit subjects using the National Senior Certificate (NSC) ratings.

It is also expected of applicants to write an admission/placement test.

Admittance into the Second and Third year of studies towards the B Com Accounting degree

The University offers two “streams” on the B Com Accounting degree. The one stream will allow students to carry on with the B Com Honours Chartered Accountancy Degree which will give access to the CA(SA) qualification, while the other stream will award students with a B Com Accounting degree and the opportunity to enter into various other honours degrees.

The main difference between the two streams is the fact that the curriculum of the CA Stream consists of year courses in the core subject areas. This is explained in the table below. To be able to take Accountancy 200 students must obtain 60% for Accountancy 1B in the first year. To gain access into Accountancy 300, students need a final mark of 60% for Accountancy 200.

B Com Honours Chartered Accountancy Degree/ Certificate in the Theory of Accounting

All four the subjects, accounting, auditing, financial management and taxation, must be passed simultaneously (in one year of study) to successfully complete the programme.

After having successfully completed the one-year programme, a B Com Honours degree from UJ together with a Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA) will be awarded to students with a degree. The CTA qualification will enable students to sit for Part One of the qualifying exam of SAICA on route to become chartered accountants.

Entry requirements

Subject to facility capacity, graduates of any South African university who are eligible for admission to an equivalent programme at the university from which they graduated, and who obtained the following average for the four major subjects in the final year of their studies will be considered for admission:

- UNISA and Natal Distance Learning – 70%
- Other SAICA accredited universities – 55%
- UJ – 55%

A minimum mark of 55% for Financial Accounting 3 is also required.

The above qualifications must have been obtained in the preceding year before qualifying for the honours degree. Accountancy must have been passed in the final year of the B Com Accounting degree.

FACILITIES OFFERED

THUTHUKA

The equity programme caters for the physical, academic and psychological needs of students. The students on the equity programme are sponsored by SAICA's Thuthuka Bursary Fund and helps students in the following ways:

- The use of group dynamics accelerates the learning process and provides students with a support structure. The students, are for instance, all staying together in a private residence where they can also form study groups.
- Students are provided with additional academic support that helps them to attain a thorough knowledge of the subject content and to stimulate discussions in class.
- By writing frequent tests, students are guided to study continuously and their progress is monitored.
- Life skills are given to help students develop those skills that are needed in the workplace.
- Students are allocated to mentors in their first year of study.
- Language and logic exercises are done to give students a better comprehension of the English language and provide them with relevant problem-solving skills and exam techniques.

The number of students on the Thuthuka Bursary Fund programme will be limited by funds made available by SAICA and available infrastructure of the University.

In addition to supporting its own students at UJ, the UJ Department of Accountancy is also involved in assisting the University of Fort Hare and the University of Limpopo in their B Com (Accounting) qualification and thereby supports the Thuthuka Education Upliftment Fund capacity building projects at these universities.

BACKGROUND

The University of KwaZulu–Natal (UKZN) offers, through its School of Accounting, which is part of the Faculty of Management Studies, a Bachelor of Commerce in Accounting, i.e. B Com (Acc), a Bachelor of Commerce Honours in Accounting i.e. B Com Hons (Acc) and a Post Graduate Diploma in Accounting i.e. PG Dip Acc, at both its Pietermaritzburg and Westville campuses.

After passing the B Com (Acc), students may register for either the B Com Hons (Acc) or the PG Dip Acc. Passing with the status of the Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA), qualifies students to write Part 1 of the Qualifying Examination of the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA). The B Com (Acc), B Com (Hons) Acc and PG Dip Acc are all accredited by SAICA..

The University also currently offers a distance learning, one year (Advanced) or two year (Intermediate or bridging) PG Dip Acc. This distance learning programme is also accredited by SAICA.

Students wishing to study further may enrol for a Master of Accountancy or a Master of Accountancy – Taxation.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The following are the admission requirements for studies commencing in 2010.

B Com (Accounting) Degree

This is the required undergraduate degree for candidates wishing to proceed to postgraduate studies which will enable them to meet SAICA's requirements, i.e. obtain the status of CTA, to write SAICA's Qualifying Examination Part 1.

For admission to the B Com (Acc) degree, prospective students must comply with the following minimum requirements:

32 National Senior Certificate points as well as the following:

English level 4

For all the Accounting modules, a sub-minimum year mark of 40% has to be obtained in each module in order to gain entry to the final examination.

Admission into the Second and Third year of B Com (Acc)

Students need to pass Accounting 101 and 102 with a mark of at least 55% to be able to enrol for Accounting 200.

Students need to pass Accounting 200 to proceed to any of the third year modules, with a minimum of 55% to be able to enrol for Accounting 300.

B Com Honours Accounting Degree / Post Graduate Diploma in Accounting

B Com Honours (Accounting)

This degree will only be offered to residential full-time students as it is not possible to effectively supervise the research component on a distance learning basis.

A candidate may be admitted to the degree B Com Hons (Accounting) on condition that he/she has successfully completed the B Com (Accounting) degree as set out above or its equivalent, and:

- (1) has obtained a minimum of 60% in Accounting 300, and
- (2) a minimum aggregate of 60% across the four third-year modules of B Com (Accounting).

Meeting the above minimum requirements does not however guarantee acceptance into B Com Hons (Accounting) as places may be limited, in which case preference will be given to UKZN students and selection will be according to academic performance.

To qualify for the award of Bachelor of Commerce Honours (Accounting) candidates must pass the following 32cp modules:

- (i) Advanced Accounting; and
- (ii) Any two of the following modules:
 - Advanced Managerial Accounting and Finance
 - Advanced Auditing
 - Advanced Taxation & Estate Planning; and
- (iii) A Research Project on a topic approved by the Head of School.

Note: the requirements to pass with CTA status and hence gain entry to SAICA's qualifying exam are dealt with below.

Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting

This diploma is offered to both residential full-time and distance learning part-time students.

A candidate may be admitted to the PG Dip Acc on condition that he/she has successfully completed the B Com (Accounting) degree as set out above or its equivalent, and:

- (1) has obtained a minimum of 55% in Accounting 300, and
- (2) a minimum aggregate of 55% across the four third-year modules of B Com (Accounting).

Meeting the above minimum requirements does not however guarantee acceptance into the PG Dip Acc as places may be limited, in which case preference will be given to UKZN students and selection will be according to academic performance.

To qualify for the PG Dip Acc, candidates shall pass the following modules:

- Advanced Accounting
- Advanced Auditing
- Advanced Managerial Accounting and Finance
- Advanced Taxation

To be awarded B Com Hons (Acc) or PG Dip Acc with CTA status

To be awarded the B Com Hons (Acc) degree or PG Dip Acc with CTA status, and hence gain entry to SAICA's Qualifying Examination Part 1, the four modules Advanced Accounting, Advanced Auditing, Advanced Managerial Accounting and Finance and Advanced Taxation must be passed (minimum 50% in each module) in the same examination session where one exam session means the year-end and supplementary exam session. However, not more than one supplementary exam is permitted for CTA purposes.

Students from other universities

Students who graduated at other institutions must make application to the School for admission and each case will be judged on its merits.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The admission requirements for studies commencing in 2010 are:

B Com: Accounting Sciences Degree

This degree is the specialised bachelor's degree for candidates who are preparing for the relevant qualifying examinations of the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA) and the Independent Regulatory Board for Auditors (IRBA). The programme BCom: Accounting Sciences, together with BCom (Hons): Accounting Sciences and the Certificate in the Theory of Accountancy (CTA) is accredited by the SAICA as part of its education requirements for the chartered accountant qualification.

For admittance to the B Com Accounting Sciences Degree, prospective students must comply with the following minimum requirements:

Candidates with an APS lower than required, or without Mathematics at the level required, may be considered for admission if they meet the additional assessment criteria specified by the University.

Admittance into the Second and Third year of studies towards the B Com Accounting Sciences Degree

A sub-minimum of a 40% year mark has to be obtained in a specific subject in order to gain access to the final examination of **that** specific subject written in November of each year.

Students need to pass Financial Accounting on first year level (FRK 100) to be able to enrol for second year Financial Accounting as well as all the other major subjects.

Students need to pass each major subject on second year level to be able to enrol for **that** subject on third year level. Students may not enrol concurrently for a second and third year major subject, for example Accounting 201 and Accounting 300 may not be taken together in one academic year.

B Com (Honours): Accounting Sciences Degree / Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA)

A candidate may be admitted to the degree B Com (Hons): Accounting Sciences and CTA in 2011 on condition that he/she obtained the following marks in 2010:

- (i) an average final mark of 57% in the following four modules:
 - Financial Accounting third year level (FRK 300)
 - Financial Management third year level (FBS 300)
 - Auditing third year level (ODT 300)
 - Taxation third year level (BEL 300); and
- (ii) a final mark of 55% in FRK 300.

A candidate who has not simultaneously completed the modules as indicated in (i) above, may be admitted to the B Com (Hons): Accounting Sciences and CTA in 2011 on condition that he/she obtained:

- (i) a mark of 50% in the extraordinary examination written in January 2011 for the third year modules already passed prior to 2010; and
- (ii) an average final mark of 57% in the four third year modules (BEL 300, FRK 300, FBS 300, ODT 300) passed in 2010 or earlier
- (iii) a final mark of 55% in FRK 300 in 2010 or earlier

Despite the above requirements, the right is reserved to, as a result of capacity constraints, limit the number of candidates admitted. Only selected candidates will be allowed to register.

A minimum of 160 credits must be obtained. The compulsory modules are:

- Financial Accounting (FRK 700)
- Financial Management (FBS 700)
- Auditing (ODT 700)
- Taxation (BEL 700)

Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA)

Candidates will be awarded the Certificate in the Theory of Accountancy if all four modules the modules on 700-level are passed at this university during the same examination session (which includes the supplementary exam session immediately following the examination session but excludes subsequent special examinations).

Only selected candidates will be allowed to register for the Certificate in the Theory of Accountancy.

The Certificate in the Theory of Accountancy will only be issued to postgraduate candidates who have passed all the core modules* listed above (for the BCom: Accounting Sciences degree) as well as the compulsory modules for the BCom (Hons): Accounting Sciences degree.

**or equivalent modules obtained at the University of Pretoria or elsewhere accepted by the Program Leader of the CA Program.*

Students from other universities wanting to do CTA

Students who graduated at other institutions must make application to the Department of Accounting for admittance and each case will be considered on merit. However, to be selected to do CTA at UP, students **will not be considered unless their undergraduate degree was accredited by SAICA**. They may however still be selected to do a bridging programme.

BACKGROUND

The School of Accounting Sciences consists of four independent academic departments, namely the Departments of Financial Accounting, Management Accounting, Taxation and Auditing. The School offers tuition by way of distance education by means of study guides, tutorial letters, prescribed books and assignments to be completed by students. All study guides and tutorial letters as well as additional resources are available online on the learning management system myUnisa (my.unisa.ac.za). Tuition is provided in English and Afrikaans.

As part of its offerings the School presents The Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA). The CTA is not an independent qualification, but a confirmation by the School of Accounting Sciences that a student has reached an acceptably high level of competence and integrated knowledge in the Accounting Sciences. The CTA enables a student to register with The South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA) to sit for its Part 1 of the Qualifying Examination (QE1). The CTA is incorporated under the Honours Bachelor of Accounting Sciences degree.

The School offers a variety of undergraduate and postgraduate degrees and diplomas as well as short courses. Students can register online, through the post, or in person at the Sunnyside campus, regional services centres and service points. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

B Compt Degree

The B Compt degree is presented mainly for candidates who wish to qualify as Chartered Accountants (CA(SA)) or as Registered Auditors.

To qualify for CTA with a view to admission to QE1 of SAICA, students must first complete a B Compt degree followed by the Honours B Compt degree. Students must have passed Mathematics at matriculation level with at least 40% on Higher Grade or at least 50% on Standard Grade, or students with the NSC must have an NSC achievement rating of at least 4 (50% - 59%) for Mathematics or 7 (80% - 89%) for Mathematical Literacy, or an equivalent examination in Mathematics. Alternatively they must have passed at least DSC1520 or one module in Statistics or Mathematics I (excluding MAT011) for the B Com or another degree or for non-degree purposes (NDP) before they will be allowed to register for any modules on second-year level towards the BCompt degree.

Students who want to register for the Honours B Compt degree must note that they have to achieve an average final mark of at least 55% for Financial Accounting at final undergraduate level. For Unisa students the following modules are considered: FAC3701, FAC3702, FAC3703 and FAC3704.

The Honours B Compt degree must be completed in one year for recognition as CTA compliant.

Honours Bachelor of Accounting Sciences

(The Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA) is incorporated under this degree.)

The curriculum and syllabus are designed for preparing students for QE1 of SAICA. Students wishing to register for an honours degree but who do not wish to pursue a career as a chartered accountant must register for an Honours B Com degree.

As explained previously, the CTA is not an independent qualification, but a confirmation by the School of Accounting Sciences that a student has reached an acceptably high level of competence and integrated knowledge in the Accounting Sciences. The CTA enables a student to register with SAICA to sit for its QE1.

Students wishing to register for the Honours B Compt must have a B Com/pt (Accounting) degree with a SAICA approved curriculum and an average final mark of at least 55% for Financial Accounting at final undergraduate level or Unisa's Post-graduate Diploma in Accounting Sciences with a final mark of at least 55% for Advanced Financial Accounting. Admission qualifications must not be more than three years old. These admission requirements are not negotiable.

Students who do not meet the above requirements for direct entry to the Honours B Compt degree are referred to the Post-graduate Diploma in Accounting Sciences.

The curriculum comprises the following four papers:

TOE407V	Applied Financial Accounting
TOE408W	Applied Management Accounting
TOE409X	Applied Taxation

TOE412S	Applied Auditing
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Four tests of one hour each are written for the four papers during the year. Examinations are written in all 4 papers in September/October. A supplementary examination during November is scheduled for students with one paper outstanding for the completion of their studies. A prerequisite for admission to the supplementary examination is that students must have written the year end examination during October 2010.

To achieve CTA status, a student must pass all 4 papers in the same examination sitting. The supplementary examination is considered the same sitting as the immediately preceding September/October examination. A student retains credit for each paper passed for purposes of the Honours B Compt (without CTA). The Honours B Compt (without CTA) may be completed in a maximum period of five years. The issuing of an Honours degree is subject to the rules of the University.

Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting Sciences

The Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting Sciences is intended for students who wish to study for the Honours B Compt degree (with the Certificate in Theory of Accountancy (CTA)) and

- who do not meet the minimum admission requirements for direct admission to the Honours B Compt, or
- who are in possession of a degree from a university that is not accredited by the SAICA, or
- whose SAICA-accredited degree or Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting Sciences is older than three years.

Students wishing to register for the Postgraduate Diploma in Accounting Sciences must have a Bachelors Degree in Accounting with the following courses or equivalent thereof:

- Financial Accounting (Third level)
- External Auditing (Third level)
- Management Accounting (Third level)
- Taxation (Third/Second level)

The curriculum comprises the following four papers:

DIPAC15	Advanced Financial Accounting
DIPAC26	Advanced Management Accounting
DIPAC38	Advanced Taxation
DIPAC49	Advanced Auditing

The postgraduate diploma cannot be completed in less than one year but must be completed within three years. Credits are retained for papers passed. It is not a requirement that all four papers be passed during the same examination period. Re-registration may be refused in any year on the basis of unsatisfactory progress.

Four tests of one hour each are written during the year. Examinations are written in all 4 papers in October/November only. A supplementary examination during November is scheduled for students with one paper outstanding for the completion of their studies.

FACILITIES OFFERED

UNISA provides various facilities and services to cater for its diverse student population. The services that are currently available to students include education and career counselling (Bureau for Counselling, Career and Academic Development), available by phone, e-mail or personal visit, the HIV/AIDS Centre that provides essential HIV/AIDS related services, and the Advocacy and Resource Centre for Students with Disabilities. Help with reading and writing can be obtained from literacy centres at some of the learning centres as can assistance from peers.

As part of its commitment to learner support, UNISA has established a number of centres to help develop its students:

- Academic Reading and Writing Centres – These centres assist undergraduate and postgraduate students with their academic reading and writing needs.
- Quantitative Literacy (Numeracy) Centres – These centres assist undergraduate and postgraduate students with their quantitative literacy needs. The mission of the UNISA Quantitative Literacy Centres is to support and develop students' learning of calculations, word problems, graphs, equations, fractions, decimals and negative numbers.
- Learning Literacy Centres – These centres learn students about a variety of study techniques that will contribute to them being successful with their tertiary studies.

UNISA also assists its students with the development of life skills such as graduate development, stress management, job readiness, presentation skills, diversity management, communication skills and planning skills.

The Unisa Library is one of the largest academic libraries in Africa and also one of the best-endowed with information resources, information technology and expert staff. The University of South Africa (Unisa) has been in existence since 1873. The Library came into being in 1946 when Unisa introduced distance teaching as a mode of tuition.

The UNISA Library has excellent information resources and a dedicated and knowledgeable staff who provide traditional library as well as sophisticated electronic information services. Students are also trained in basic and advanced research skills. The Library has branches countrywide, which actively support the teaching, research and community service programmes of the University.

The last number of years have been a period of rapid growth, with the printed book collection now totalling over one and a half million items. In addition, the Library stocks over three

hundred thousand other items as well as four thousand current periodical titles. The Library also subscribes to an increasing number of electronic journals (e-journals). Both the e-journals and the growing collection of electronic books (e-books) are available to Unisa students and staff online 24/7 via the Internet, regardless of the user's physical location.



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BACKGROUND

The Department of Accounting specialises in the education of professional accountants. Our flagship undergraduate programme, the Bachelor of Accounting (BAcc) programme, coupled with the postgraduate Bachelor of Accounting with Honours (BAccHons) programme, focuses on the education of prospective Chartered Accountants. These programmes are accredited by the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA) as part of the education requirements for qualification as a Chartered Accountant (SA) (CA(SA)).

The Department also offers a range of advanced postgraduate degrees at Master's and Doctoral level in the subject areas of Auditing, Computer Auditing, Financial Accounting, Management Accounting and Taxation.

The Department consists of a team of dedicated staff all appropriately qualified for lecturing in their specialised fields. Staff of the Department is actively involved in research and publish regularly in both accredited and popular journals. Furthermore, staff of the Department is involved in various community interaction initiatives.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The Degree B Accounting (B Acc)

The BAcc programme is a selection programme and only a limited number of students are admitted. Students who want to be considered for admission must write the University's Access Tests no later than the middle of August each year, as selection takes place during September. Applications close at the end of June.

Admission requirements are as follows:

- General University Admission *
- Minimum EMS Language admission requirements**
- A Grade 12 average of at least a 6 (70%)
- Mathematics at least a 5 (60%)
- Mathematics 6 (70%) OR Accounting 6 (70%)

***General University Admission**

- Compulsory access tests in Mathematics, Mathematics Literacy and Academic Literacy (in both Afrikaans and English)
- National Senior Certificate (NSC) with at least a 4 (50%) in four NSC university admission subjects
- An average of at least 50% between the University's Access Tests and the Grade 12 average (calculated on a 40:60 ratio)

****Minimum EMS Language Requirements***

- Afrikaans OR English Home Language at least a 4 (50%)
- AND**
- English OR Afrikaans First Additional Language at least a 5 (60%).

Prospective students who do not satisfy any of the abovementioned language requirements can be conditionally admitted to a programme of the Faculty provided:

- that at least a 3 (40%) is obtained in those specific language subjects AND
- that Language Development 114 (12) and Language Development 144 (12) are compulsory extra modules for the first year and must be passed at the end of the year to be able to register for second year modules.

Alternative routes to qualification as a CA (SA) are available for applicants who do not meet these admission requirements. Please contact the Department directly for further information in this regard.

Admittance to second and third year of BAcc degree

In order to be eligible to write the examination in any subject, a student must have a year mark of at least 40%. Students must pass a particular subject in a lower year of study to be eligible to register for *that subject* in a more advanced year of study (e.g. Financial Accounting 178 (first year) has to be passed before being eligible to register for Financial Accounting 278). Also, to be eligible to register for certain subjects in the second and third years of study, students have to pass certain *other subjects* at a lower level (e.g. to register for Taxation 399, Financial Accounting 278 has to be passed). In order to pass a subject, a student requires a final mark of at least 50%.

The Bachelor of Accounting with Honours (BAccHons) Degree

To register for Part I of the Qualifying Examination (QE1), SAICA requires a candidate to have a Certificate in the Theory of Accounting (CTA) or equivalent. The BAccHons degree is accredited by SAICA as the equivalent of the CTA. Consequently, successful completion of this programme meets the entry requirement for writing QE1.

The BAccHons degree is a selection programme. Applications close on 15 November each year. Only students who meet the admission requirements set out below are admitted to the programme:

- A BAcc or BAccLLB degree from Stellenbosch University or equivalent qualification from another university; **AND**
- A final weighted average mark of at least **60%** in Financial Accounting 379 (weighting 48), Management Accounting 378 (weighting 36), Auditing 378 (weighting 36) and Taxation 399 (weighting 36) (or equivalent modules); **OR**
- A final weighted average mark of at least **55%** in the above-mentioned four subjects **AND** a final mark of 55% for Financial Accounting 379 (or equivalent module).

The four subjects mentioned in the admission requirements need not be passed in the same academic year.

The programme comprises the following subjects (with their approximate relative weightings in the lectures, tests and examinations as indicated):

Subject	Weighting
Financial Accounting	40%
Auditing, Regulation and Information Systems	20%
Management Accounting and Financial Management	20%
Taxation	20%
TOTAL	100%

In order to be eligible to write the examination at the end of the programme, a student has to have a *weighted average* year mark (using the weightings above) of at least 40% across all four subjects (i.e. not per subject).

To obtain the degree, a student requires a *weighted average* final mark (using the weightings above) across the four subjects of at least 50% **and** a final mark of at least 45% per subject.

A student who did not pass the final examination in the BAccHons degree can qualify for a supplementary examination. If, after the supplementary examination, a student has achieved a *weighted average* final mark of at least 50% across the four subjects **and** a final mark of at least 45% per subject, the degree is awarded to the student.

Language policy

The lectures for all BAcc subjects at *first year* level are in English and in Afrikaans. The lectures for most BAcc subjects in *subsequent undergraduate years* and all subjects at *BAccHons level* are in Afrikaans, although most text books, class notes and test and examination papers and their suggested solutions are also available in English. Questions posed in English during lectures are generally answered in English. FACILITIES OFFERED

Stellenbosch University lies tucked away in the picturesque Jonkershoek Valley in the heart of the Western Cape Wine-lands, approximately one hour from Cape Town. Since its humble beginnings in 1866, the University has grown into the internationally recognised institution of excellence it is today with more than 24 000 students, 800 lecturers and some 50 research and service bodies. The campuses of Stellenbosch University, of which the Stellenbosch campus is the primary one, are a vibrant melting pot of different cultures in which numerous student organisations are represented.

General transformation initiatives

The Department strives to address historical imbalances in accounting education by actively pursuing a programme of ongoing educational assistance focused on students from the designated groups. These students are *inter alia* afforded the opportunity to attend an additional lecture per week in each of the core subjects and to be brought into contact with subject-specific mentors.

Thuthuka Bursary Fund

Stellenbosch University has been a proud partner university in this initiative since 2007. Being located in the Western Cape, our Thuthuka Bursary Fund programme focuses predominantly on Afrikaans speaking students from the Coloured community. The Thuthuka students are looked after by a dedicated project manager employed by the Department.

The Stellenbosch University Thuthuka Programme provides extensive academic and non-academic support for its students. Thuthuka students take part in the normal academic programme for BAcc students. They are required, however, to attend all additional support lectures, practicals and tutorial classes offered in all subjects. In addition, they participate in various interactive life-skills and workplace-readiness workshops. They are also required to do vacation work during at least one university break per year, as well as to participate in a community involvement project of their choice. For the duration of their studies, the students reside in university accommodation in close proximity to each other to allow them to support each other.

The academic and social well-being of the students is carefully monitored on a continual basis and, where necessary, timeous interventions are affected.

B.Com. (Acc.)

The Department of Accounting offers the B. Com. (Acc.) degree over three years or four years. Students can however not apply for the four year course. Placement on this course will be determined by the Faculty, based on the applicant's Grade 12 results.

In order to be considered for selection* to the B.Com. (Acc.) degree, an applicant must have attained a minimum of 27 (for applications to commence studies in 2012: 30) points in Grade 12, calculated as follows:

 - a. Financial Accounting third year level
 - b. Management Accounting and Financial Management third year level
 - c. Auditing third year level
 - d. Taxation third year level
4. A minimum exam or final mark of 55% in each of the four subjects listed under 3. above.

FACILITIES OFFERED

The University of the Western Cape is centrally located in the Cape Peninsula. The main campus is situated in Bellville South and is conveniently located close to the N1 and N2 national roads, and easily accessible from those roads via other main roads. There is a railway station next to the campus, with a bus service of the City also passing the campus at regular intervals. There are residence facilities available on campus. The normal university facilities and activities are available to students, like the library, sport facilities and cultural activities.



BACKGROUND

The School of Accountancy is a School of the Faculty Commerce Law and Management.

The undergraduate tuition for the CA route is offered through the three year degree Bachelor of Accounting Science and in the B Com with appropriate majors in Accounting. Lectures are presented in larger groups supported by smaller tutorial sessions and consultation opportunities with lecturers and tutors.

These degrees lead to the choice of post graduate programmes:

- the Bachelor of Accounting Science with Honours: a student is required to attend and complete the units Financial Accounting IV, Taxation IV, Auditing IV and Management Accounting and Finance IV together with a research report/dissertation at Honours level. All four units must be completed in the same academic year. The research report may be completed in any one of the fields of Financial Accounting, Auditing, Managerial Accounting or Taxation.
- The Higher Diploma in Accountancy: this is a one year graduate entry diploma comprising the four units: Financial Accounting IV, Taxation IV, Auditing IV and Management Accounting and Finance IV. All four units must be completed in the same academic year.
- Students who enter the Bachelor of Commerce route are given the opportunity to write a bridging examination (subject to their marks attained in Accounting, to convert to the CA

route and may proceed to the Higher Diploma in Accountancy or to the Bachelor of Commerce with Honours in the field of Accounting.

The School and the University is well equipped to offer various other academic programmes to its alumni. This includes Masters and Doctoral degrees in Auditing, Accountancy, Taxation and Business Administration.

Research is an important facet of the work of the Faculty and the School and well qualified staff are at hand to assist and guide our students. Generous bursaries and scholarships are available to students and staff is supported through a waiving of fees award to encourage the achievement of higher degrees by our own staff. The University is committed to maintaining its international standing in this sphere.

The School and the University is well respected nationally and internationally with close ties to prestigious institutions in all major countries. The University's vision and commitment to its future development as a Top international 100 higher education institution is articulated in the Wits Shaping the Future document.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

At going to press the following admission requirements were prescribed. It is proposed that the University be contacted and the Rules and Syllabuses Guideline for the Faculty of Commerce, Law and Management be studied.

The Rules for the year in which the student enters the University apply for the duration of the degree, provided the student passes all courses. The University reserves the right to convert a student's registration to a new set of rules of a subsequent

year if the student does not process successful but is permitted to remain a student.

General

A prospective student must apply in writing on the University's application form submitting evidence of academic and general qualifications. Applicants must have passed a course in English as first or second language at the higher grade at matriculation level or at a level considered equivalent by the Senate or deemed to be equivalent by legislation.

The minimum requirement for admission to a programme leading to the award of bachelor is matriculation in the form of a university entrance examination or a matriculation endorsement from Umalusi or the granting of complete or conditional matriculation exemption by the Matriculation Board of Higher Education South Africa (HESA).

An applicant must be issued with a certificate of conditional exemption by HESA if that applicant, in the opinion of the Senate has demonstrated, in a selection process approved by the Senate, that s/he is suitable for admission to the University. Where the Senate certifies that the holder of a certificate of conditional exemption issued in terms of this paragraph has completed the normal requirements of the curriculum for the first year of study of any qualification, HESA must issue a certificate of complete exemption to him/her, dated from the first day in January of the year in which the first degree credit was obtained.

Bachelor of Accounting Science (BAcc Sci) CB 0008

The programme of BAcc Sci extends over not less than three years of full time study. The degree offers the graduate admission to the Bachelor of Accounting Science with Honours and the Certificate in the Theory of Accountancy (CTA) which makes the candidate eligible to write the relevant qualifications of the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA) and the Independent Regulatory Board for Auditors (IRBA).

The programme offered by the School is accredited by SAICA as part of its education requirements for the Chartered Accountant Qualification.

Transfer to Bachelor of Accounting Science

A person who has registered for the programme of Bachelor of Commerce, and who at the end of the first year of study wishes to proceed instead with the programme of Bachelor of Accounting Science, must apply for admission to the programme through the normal admission routes. Permission to transfer will not normally be granted unless the student has obtained a mark of at least 60% in Accounting 1 (ACCN1006), and has passed Computational Maths (APPM1004) as well as additional units totalling at least 54 points.

Admission to Bachelor of Accounting Science with Honours (B Acc Sci Hons)

The following may be admitted:

- Students holding a B Acc Sci Hons of this or any other university;
- A person accepted by virtue of having passed at any other university or institution such examinations as are, in the opinion of the Senate, equivalent to the examinations prescribed for the programme of Bachelor of Accounting Science;
- A person other than a graduate who, in the opinion of the Senate, is so qualified.

A candidate for the B Acc Sci Hons will be required to attend and complete all four of the following units in the same academic year and complete a semester paper in any of the fields:

- Financial Accounting IV
- Taxation IV

- Auditing IV
- Management Accounting and Finance IV

Higher diploma in Accountancy

The Senate may permit a graduate or a student of the University or another university who in its opinion should be exempted from nine or more of the units prescribed for the programme of Bachelor of Accountancy to proceed as a student for the Higher Diploma in Accountancy for a period of at least one academic year of full-time study. A similar ruling is applicable to students in Bachelor of Commerce with Honours in Accountancy.

The curriculum extends over at least one academic year of full-time study and comprise the following units which must be completed in the same academic year:

Financial Accounting IV

Taxation IV

Auditing IV

Management Accounting and Finance IV

Please note: The University of the Witwatersrand has the right to change the admission requirements. A restricted number of students are accepted in certain fields of study.

FACILITIES OFFERED

Faculties

The University is structured into five faculties which comprise 37 Schools, one being the School of Accountancy where many past and future Chartered Accountants were and will be lectured.

Libraries

The Library system comprises two main libraries and 14 divisional libraries. There are two major libraries on the West Campus serving the Accountancy students – the Commerce Library and the Law Library (for Commercial Law). In addition the School hosts a small divisional library the Edmunds Library, for use by post graduate students and staff.

School of Accountancy – location

The School of Accountancy is located In the FNB Building, West Campus in Braamfontein. This building is currently (2008) in the process of being enlarged and improved to allow for additional and improved lecture and tutorial theatres, computer laboratories and student recreational centres. The new venues will also be equipped with state of the art teaching material. This project will take 24 months to complete and it is anticipated that the new facilities will be operational in 2010.

Residences

Students can be housed in 20 residences which accommodate some 22% of the student population. The University of the Witwatersrand is an urban university serving the citizens of Johannesburg and Gauteng and hence most students live at home. Increasingly many students choose private rented rooms or apartments in Braamfontein in close proximity to Johannesburg.

Sport and recreation

The University accommodates about any conceivable sport activity such as soccer, rugby, fishing, rowing, mountain climbing, squash, golf and many more.

There are many informal and cosy restaurants and gathering spots on campus where students get the opportunity to relax and meet their fellows as well as lecturers and tutors

THUTHUKA

The University has currently more than a hundred such students on the Thuthuka Bursary Fund programme in their 2nd, 3rd and 4th years of study and is working towards a programme where additional intakes into the first year can be made in future.

Although it is a demanding task to adhere to all prescribed requirements of the programme, the School endeavours to provide the following special attention to these students:

- Special lectures and tutorials
- Special mentoring on studies and the university environment
- Skills development

- Accommodation preferences when in selected residences
- Library facilities
- Financial assistance through the Thuthuka Bursary Fund as administered by SAICA.
